Covering Campus Protests: Student Journalists Tell Their Stories

hree courageous university students will detail their experiences about how they covered campus protests and the legal support they needed. A Dartmouth University photographer and two students from Columbia University, the editor of the daily newspaper and a radio reporter, will share their stories as part of a panel that will be moderated by a national Student Press Rights advocate for the First Amendment. The audience will have the opportunity to ask questions and to discuss the challenges of reporting in the current environment.

John Tagliareni is a founding member of the GSSPA, and he continues to serve on the executive board and as a Past President. He co-led the New Jersey New Voices Team, making NJ the 15th state to pass New Voices Legislation. He has served as a member of the JEA's Student Press Rights Commission since 1990. For 37 years, he advised Bergenfield (NJ) High School's newspaper, Bear Facts, which earned state and national awards. He has been recognized by state and national scholastic and professional press organizations for his service over the years.

ALESANDRA "Dre" GONZALES



Dre Gonzales is a Multimedia Editor, photographer, and staff writer for *The Dartmouth*, driven by a love of public service that runs through both her reporting and her work as an emergency medical technician in Texas and New Hampshire. Her coverage spans campus protests, the impacts of gun violence, criminal cases, and community features. Stories she's pitched and reported have taken her to on-the-ground breaking news and enterprise assignments across the Upper Valley and South Texas, and her work appears across *The Dartmouth* and the *Uvalde Leader-News* in print, digital, and multimedia formats. When Dre's not on assignment she serves as an EMT on the board of Dartmouth EMS. Dre was arrested on May 1, 2024, while covering a campus protest on the Dartmouth Green. In October 2024, she received the Student Press Law Center's Courage in Student Journalism Award. Dre is expected to graduate from Dartmouth College in June 2027 with a B.A. in psychology and a minor in film.

Natalie Lahr is a Sophomore at Barnard College of Columbia University, double-majoring in Political Science and Human Rights. Natalie first connected with the Student Press Law Center in high school after a podcast episode she produced for PBS NewsHour's Student Reporting Labs faced censorship from administrators. She currently works as a field reporter for Columbia University's student-run radio station, primarily covering the student protest movement, union relations, and other breaking news on campus. In May of 2025, Natalie was suspended and faced eviction from student housing after reporting live from inside a sit-in at Columbia University's Butler Library. This experience solidified her commitment to broadcast/radio journalism as a powerful storytelling medium and reignited her passion for press freedom advocacy. She hopes that by equipping the future generations of journalists with tools to combat censorship and retaliation, they will be empowered to tell stories that matter.

Shea Vance is a senior at Barnard College of Columbia University majoring in American Studies. She serves as the 149th editor in chief and president of the Columbia Daily Spectator, Columbia's independent flagship student newspaper and the second-oldest college daily in the nation. Formerly a university news editor, Shea has spent the majority of her time at Spectator reporting on Columbia and Barnard administration, finances, and campus protests. Shea helped lead Spectator's award-winning coverage of the 2024 encampment protests that made headlines across the world, and now leads Spectator's newsroom as it covers unprecedented federal scrutiny and administrative tumult at Columbia. Aside from campus reporting, Shea writes for amNewYork, a local newspaper in New York City with a circulation of over 300,000, where her coverage focuses on local politics and the upcoming mayoral election.

PROTECTING SPEECH RIGHTS OF STUDENT JOURNALISTS, TEACHERS, AND ADVISERS



Both houses of the New Jersey legislature passed our New Voices Law unanimously in June, 2021. Governor Phil Murphy signed the bill on December 21, 2021. It is now law!

The law reaffirms the First Amendment rights of student journalists under the Tinker standard and also protects journalism teachers and advisers in public high schools and institutions of higher learning from retribution for supporting their students. The law, which went into effect immediately upon Governor Murphy's signing, also mandates that each school district in the state develop and adopt a publications policy, consistent with the law, by the start of this school year.

New Jersey is the 15th state to pass this type of protection, but there's more work to be done.

The Student Press Law Center has created a guide that will help all New Jersey stakeholders understand the New Voices Law. Please access the information entitled, "A Guide to New Jersey's New Voices Act" at splc.org. https://splc.org/know-your-rights-new-jersey/

Teachers and students, should check to make sure that their school boards have adopted a publications policy that complies with the law. The information from the SPLC will help you. They have a form for that!
